The Nativity Fast, while more relaxed than Great Lent, prepares us through prayer, fasting, almsgiving, and good works to approach the Nativity of Christ in such a way as we would if the Lord Himself appeared to us on Christmas Day (as He does through the Divine Liturgy!)

There is also the tradition of giving gifts during the Christmas season.

This tradition comes from the three Magi (aka Wise Men) presenting our Lord with Gold (fit for a king), Frankincense (fit for worship of God), and Myrhh (fit for the burial of a man).

While we share Christ's love with our family and friends by buying them gifts, we need to remember the poor and needy, and help look after them as best as we can. Most importantly though, we should remember that this tradition began with the 3 Magi presenting gifts to our Lord. We should likewise present the Lord with the gift that he desires most from us. That we love the Lord our God with all of our heart, soul, mind and strength; and that we love our neighbors as ourselves.


While the world is feasting this Christmas season, there are many families which are in need. While we pray and fast, we also have the opportunity to share Christ's Love with those most in need.

Sharing with those in need is greater than any Christmas present we could give to our family or friends. When we give to the poor, it's like we are giving gifts to Christ Himself!

While we prepare for the Nativity of our Lord with Prayer, Fasting, and Church Attendance, let us also join ourselves to the 3 Wise Men, bringing our gifts to Christ, with the poor receiving these gifts on His behalf.

Journey to Reality: Waking Up from the Modern Fog



Many Orthodox Christians quietly assume that the struggle with modernity is mostly a "convert problem," Journey to Reality: Sacramental Life in a Secular Age (Dr. Zachary Porcu, Ancient Faith Publishing) is a bracing reminder that none of us, converts or life-long Orthodox, easily escape the larger cultural milieu we live in. Modernity has trained all of us to see the world as flat, disenchanted, and essentially material.

Porcu shows how this mindset slips into our Christian lives in subtle ways. Even devout Orthodox sometimes describe the Mysteries with language that treats the "spiritual" as symbolic or less real than the physical, an assumption far closer to modern secularism than to the Fathers.

He calls us back to the Church's ancient vision, where sacramental grace affects a real ontological (or, category) transformation: a change into a deeper mode of existence that science cannot measure but the saints know intimately.

At just 137 pages, the book is accessible yet profound, philosophical yet warmly pastoral. It exposes the hidden habits of thought that shape us far more than we realize; and offers a way to reclaim a fully sacramental imagination.

For anyone who senses that their instincts about the world feel more secular than they ought to, this book is a needed wake-up call. Dr. Porcu's message is simple yet profound: to awaken from the disenchanted slumber of modernity and fully embrace the layered, luminous, sacramental, and participatory reality of Christ's Body, the Church.

Notes from the Choir... First We Anticipate, Then We Celebrate

Remember when you were a little kid and you started getting excited about your birthday, weeks in advance? You made sure everyone knew your birthday was coming. You told your parents what gift you were hoping for and you thought carefully about what kind of cake to have. You put a lot of time and energy into preparing for your big day. This anticipation was a significant part of your birthday - a prelude to the actual celebration.

The Church also follows this pattern of anticipation before celebration. The Church Fathers and hymnographers who wrote, compiled, and ordered the services and the Church calendar, were masters in human psychology (long before psychology was a thing!) They understood that we frail humans need "frontloading" before a significant event.

Our preparation for Our Lord's birthday, properly called the Holy Nativity of Our Lord God and Saviour, Jesus Christ, begins 40 days in advance with the start of our Nativity Fast. Fasting is one important way we get ready for a major Church Feast.

The Church also prepares us through Liturgical hymnography. Six days into the Nativity Fast, we celebrate the **Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple.**

The troparion (theme song) for this occasion tells us plainly that this Feast is a prelude to the Nativity of Our Lord: Today is the **preview** of the good will of God...The Virgin appears in the temple of God, in **anticipation** proclaiming Christ to all!

During the Vigil on the eve of the Entrance, you may notice that some of the words sound very "Christmas-y". That is because they actually **are** Christmas hymns! At the end of each Canon Ode, the katavasia (last verse) read or sung is from the Nativity hymns; they function kind of like a movie trailer, letting us know what's coming up. [If you have no idea what a Canon is, but you're curious, feel free to ask Fr. Gregory, or Dn. Theodore, or me.]

On the two Sundays preceding Christmas, we commemorate the Forefathers and Ancestors of Christ. (If you're not at least mildly shocked by the idea of God having ancestors, now would be a good time to ponder the paradox of Christ's Incarnation.)

The last five days before the Nativity, December 20 - 24, form a "Holy Week" that is directly patterned after the Holy Week before Pascha.



First We Anticipate, Then We Celebrate Continued...

There are special services and hymns prescribed every day. [In coming years, we hope to celebrate some of these services at St. Herman's.] The Liturgical highlight of this time is the Kontakion of the Prefeast of Nativity:

Today the Virgin comes to a cave where she will bear so wondrously the Eternal Word; let all the earth rejoice! Hearing the glad tidings, let us come with the shepherds and angels, bringing glory to Him! Let us come and worship Him, Who for mankind's sake is revealed: the Eternal God - a little Child!

This hymn is our official invitation to the Great Feast of Christ's Incarnation. Our final preparation is the service of the **Royal Hours of Nativity**, which we will celebrate at St. Herman's at 3:00 p.m. on Christmas Eve, directly before we start celebrating the actual Feast, the Nativity of Our Lord, with the Great Vigil.

Hearing the glad tidings...
Let us come and worship Him!


